Sermon Synopsis

In the bustling heart of Rome, before the historic Trevi Fountains, Dr. Billy Wilson shares a message titled 'For God So Loved the World'. Bible Study

Objectives

Reading and Reflections

- Reflect on Psalm 24:1-2 to acknowledge God's ownership and our responsibility towards His creation.
- Study 1 John 4:9-10 to appreciate the manifestation of God's love through Jesus Christ.
- Meditate on Romans 5:8 to see the demonstration of God's love even while we were still sinners.

Key Observations

- The term 'world' in John 3:16 translates to 'cosmos', encompassing all of creation.

- Strive to replace negative thoughts about people or situations with prayerful reflection on God's love for them.

- Explore the intricacies of the human body, DNA, and the vastness of space as testimony to God's creative power.
- Research historical examples of revivals and awakenings where God's love transformed societies.
- Dive deeper into the original Greek meanings of key terms in John 3:16 and related scriptures.
