

Responding Rightly

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Sermon Synopsis

In the shadow of the somber remnants of Auschwitz, Dr. Billy Wilson delivers a powerful message of hope and responsibility. Amidst the chilling reminders of the Holocaust's atrocity, where over a million Jews perished, he urges Christians to respond with compassion and understanding to the Jewish people. The sermon, steeped in historical context, begins with the roots of Zionism and traces the tumultuous path leading to the establishment of the State of Israel. The narrative of suffering and survival is a call to action for believers to embrace their Jewish brethren.

Dr. Wilson delves into the biblical and historical connections between Christianity and Judaism, emphasizing the Jewish contribution to the Christian faith. Drawing from Acts 15, he highlights the early church's struggle with integrating Gentile believers and the subsequent council that affirmed the inclusion of non-Jews without the need to adhere to Jewish customs. This pivotal moment in Christian history serves as a foundation for the sermon's core message: Christians are called to bless and honor the Jewish people, acknowledging their significant role as the root of the Christian faith.

The sermon outlines four critical responses Christians should adopt towards the Jewish community. First, to bless and honor them, recognizing the eternal covenant between God and Abraham. Second, to seek understanding, acknowledging the Jewish people's rich heritage and their longing for peace. Third, to pray fervently for their salvation and the peace of Jerusalem. And fourth, to share the gospel of Jesus Christ with them, affirming that salvation is available to all, Jew and Gentile alike, through faith in Christ alone.

Dr. Wilson's message is a poignant reminder of the horrors of the Holocaust and the resilience of the Jewish people. He presents the Fountain of Tears, a powerful sculpture that juxtaposes the

crucifixion of Christ with the tragedy of the Holocaust. This artistic expression serves as a metaphor for the shared suffering and ultimate hope found in Jesus. The sermon concludes with a heartfelt invitation to Jewish viewers to embrace Jesus as their Messiah and to Christians to actively participate in healing, understanding, and evangelizing with love and respect.

Sermon Highlights

- Bless and honor the Jewish people, recognizing their significance in God's plan and the
 deep roots of Christianity in Jewish heritage, as established through the Abrahamic
 covenant where God promises blessings to those who bless Abraham's descendants
 (Genesis 12:1-3).
- Seek to understand the Jewish people, engaging with their rich history, enduring faith, family values, aspiration for peace, and distinct role in God's prophetic timeline, thereby fostering a genuine relationship founded on empathy and respect.
- Pray for the Jewish people, petitioning God for their salvation, the peace of Jerusalem (Psalm 122:6), and for revival in Israel, as Paul expresses his heartfelt desire for their salvation in Romans 10:1.
- Share Jesus with the Jewish people, communicating the exclusivity of salvation through Christ (John 14:6, Acts 4:12), and the growing number of Jewish people who are recognizing Jesus as their Messiah, indicating an awakening to faith in Him within the Jewish community.
- Encourage action among believers, calling for prayer, understanding, and the blessing of
 the Jewish people, and to spread the message of Jesus' sacrificial love and redemption to
 all, starting with the Jews, as He is the way, the truth, and the life for both Jews and
 Gentiles alike.

Scripture Verses

Genesis 12:1-3

The LORD had said to Abram, 'Go from your country, your people and your father's household to the land I will show you. I will make you into a great nation, and I will bless you; I will make your name great, and you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and whoever curses you I will curse; and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you.'

Acts 15:7-11

After much discussion, Peter got up and addressed them: 'Brothers, you know that some time ago God made a choice among you that the Gentiles might hear from my lips the message of the gospel and believe. God, who knows the heart, showed that he accepted them by giving the Holy

Spirit to them, just as he did to us. He did not discriminate between us and them, for he purified their hearts by faith. John 14:6

Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.'

Acts 4:12

Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved.

Romans 10:12-13

For there is no difference between Jew and Gentile—the same Lord is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on him, for, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'

Romans 11:11-12

Again I ask: Did they stumble so as to fall beyond recovery? Not at all! Rather, because of their transgression, salvation has come to the Gentiles to make Israel envious. But if their transgression means riches for the world, and their loss means riches for the Gentiles, how much greater riches will their full inclusion bring!

Key Observations

- The Holocaust stands as a grim reminder of the depths of human depravity and the urgent need for the love of Christ to be evident in our world.
- Jewish people have a significant and enduring covenant relationship with God.
- The Christian faith is rooted in Judaism, as Jesus was born a Jew and fulfilled Jewish prophecies.
- Sharing the gospel with Jewish people should be done with sensitivity and respect, recognizing the historical and spiritual context.

Personal Reflections

- Dedicate specific time each day to pray for the peace of Jerusalem and the salvation of Jewish people.

Further Study

- Study the history of Israel and the journey of the Jewish people as God's chosen nation.
- Reflect on the lives of key Jewish figures in the Bible and their role in salvation history.
- Delve into Messianic prophecies and their fulfillment in the New Testament.

Daily Devotionals

Day 1

Scripture Verse

Reflection

Day 2

Scripture Verse

Psalm 122:6 (NIV) - 'Pray for the peace of Jerusalem: May those who love you be secure.'

Reflection

In the shadow of Auschwitz's gates - a stark reminder of the depths of human depravity - let our hearts be moved to genuine intercession for the peace of Jerusalem and all Israel. The Psalmist exhorts us to pray for this ancient city that has withstood the test of time and turmoil, and for the people who have clung to the hope of peace through the ages. Day 3

Scripture Verse

Romans 1:16 (NIV) - 'For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile.'

Reflection

Standing amidst the vestiges of unspeakable atrocities, one cannot help but grapple with the weight of history. Yet in the gospel, we find an unshakable truth - it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes. This power, potent and pure, was first offered to the Jewish people and then to the Gentile world.
